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Customs' Proposed New Goods Clearance Fees

Portfolio Customs

On 4 December 2019, the Cabinet Economic Development Committee (DEV):

Proposed changes to fees

- noted that on 24 July 2019, DEV agreed to the release of a discussion document on proposed changes to the New Zealand Customs Service's (Customs) goods clearance fees [DEV-19-MIN-0193];
- 2 noted that Customs has reviewed the submissions received, and that based on this feedback and the application of accepted Public Service cost recovery principles, Customs proposes changes to its goods clearance fees and two other fees;
- agreed to the changes to Customs' goods clearance fees and two other fees, as set out in Appendix A to the paper under DEV-19-SUB-0334;
- 4 **invited** the Minister of Customs to issue drafting instructions to the Parliamentary Counsel Office to give effect to paragraph 3 above, including by updating the fee levels and including the costs of investigations and seizures;
- 5 **invited** the Minister of Customs to issue drafting instructions to the Parliamentary Counsel Office to clarify the clearance requirements outlined in the paper under DEV-19-SUB-0334, including by ensuring that the goods cost recovery fees are collected at the appropriate points in the clearance process;
- 6 authorised the Minister of Customs to approve any minor and technical changes as the drafting is progressed;
- 7 **noted** that the discussion document referred to in paragraph 1 above stated that two of the proposed fees did not fully recover costs;
- 8 noted that Customs will review the fees in two years when the full impact of changes will be known;
- 9 noted that in response to submissions received, Customs will set up a stakeholder group as a broad engagement forum that can be used to support importers and exporters;

Draw down of Budget 2019 contingency

- noted that on 24 September 2018, Cabinet agreed that GST would be collected via an offshore supplier registration system on imported goods valued at or below \$1,000, and that Customs would no longer collect the Import Entry Transaction Fee on all goods valued at \$1,000 or less [CAB-18-MIN-0466.01];
- 11 noted that on 15 April 2019, as part of its Budget 2019 decisions, Cabinet established a tagged operating contingency to provide for *Funding to Continue Protecting New Zealand from Imported Threats*, pending the completion of Customs' Goods Cost Recovery Review [CAB-19-MIN-0174.10];
- noted that on 12 June 2019, DEV agreed to a 1 December 2019 implementation date for the GST on low-value imported goods policy, reducing the 2019/20 amount in the above tagged contingency by \$2.336 million to \$6.886 million [DEV-19-MIN-0153], resulting as a tagged contingency as follows:

- agreed that, as the conditions have now been met with the work described in paragraph 11 above having been completed, the funding from the above tagged contingency now be released (rephased as necessary to reflect Customs' actual costs);
- approved the following changes to appropriations to give effect to the policy decision in paragraph 3 above, with a corresponding impact on the operating balance and net core Crown debt:

- agreed that the change to appropriations for 2019/20 above be included in 2019/20 Supplementary Estimates and that, in the interim, the increase be met from Imprest Supply;
- 16 agreed that the expenses incurred under paragraph 14 above be charged against the Funding to Continue Protecting New Zealand from Imported Threats tagged operating contingency described in paragraphs 11-12 above;
- agreed that, in the event the review referred to in paragraph 8 above leads to either full cost recovery or a move towards full cost recovery for the two fees in paragraph 7 above, the commensurate reduction in revenue Crown requirement be reflected in the next available baseline update;

18 noted that Customs will establish, with approval of the Minister of Finance and the Minister of Customs, a memorandum account to cover the fully cost recovered goods clearance activities;
