# Transport operator checks

There are checks you will need to complete when you collect a container, en route, and on delivery. If a container is being stored overnight (hubbing) then there are additional checks to be completed.

#### On collection

When you pick up a container, you must complete these checks.

- Ensure that the container you are transporting matches the paperwork you have.
- Ensure all container numbers and markings are intact and match the paperwork you have.
- Check that the seal has been correctly applied. Seal checks can be remembered using the acronym V.V.T.T. — View and Verify, Tug and Twist.
- You will need to sign documentation confirming that you have undertaken the V.V.T.T. check and record the date and time of collection.

## View and Verify, Tug and Twist

View and Verify — Look at the container and seal number and confirm that the information matches what is recorded in your documentation.

Tug and Twist — Pull the cable block and turn the Klicker bolt. Physically check the seal to ensure that it has been fastened tightly and is intact.





## On your journey

If your journey includes stops, or is interrupted, you must complete these checks.

- Complete a V.V.T.T. check every time that you stop and when you return to your vehicle.
- If you handover the container to another driver, complete a V.V.T.T. check. Record the date and time of the handover and name of the recipient driver.
- Ensure dispatchers are informed of any changes to the planned route.

## On delivery

When you arrive at the port or railhead, you must complete these checks.

- Complete a V.V.T.T. check
- Record the date and time of delivery and obtain a signature from the person receiving the container (electronic confirmation is acceptable).

### Overnight or extended storage (hubbing)

- If you need to store the container overnight or for an extended period, it must be at an approved storage site.
- You will need to visually check that the seal is intact (at least once daily).
- Immediately before removing the container from the storage facility, you must complete a V.V.T.T.
  check
- Follow agreed reporting procedures should you see any suspicious activity, such as unauthorised people in the container storage area, or damage to the container or seal.

#### If damage to the seal or container is identified

If, at any time, you identify that the SES seal has been damaged or if there are any suspicious changes to the container, you must do the following.

- Immediately notify your dispatcher. Do not remove, replace, or dispose of the seal yourself until you receive further instructions.
- Follow agreed reporting procedures.

In the event of a breakdown or disruption en route:

- Immediately notify your dispatcher.
- If the truck is repaired at the breakdown location, or a replacement truck is sent, prior to completing the journey, complete a V.V.T.T. check.
- If the container is removed and loaded onto another truck at the breakdown location, prior to completing the journey, complete a V.V.T.T. check.
- If the container is returned to the load site, all checks must be completed again by the next Transport Operator / Driver.
- Please note, if a container that should have been transported in one trip unexpectedly needs to be stored overnight, it must be stored at a SES approved site.
